Mutual Respect	NGA has high expectations of students, reflected in the Behaviour Policy and the School Vision that underpins the work of the school. Mutual respect is promoted through all lessons, registration and assemblies. Democracy	NGA values the Student Voice. We have elected form representatives, Year Councils, School Council and Head Girl elections. Democracy is promoted through registration and lessons where appropriate and school assemblies. We encourage volunteerism in and out of school. 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Rule of Law	NGA has high expectations of students, reflected in the Behaviour Policy and the School Vision that underpins the work of the school. Through assemblies, registration periods, intervention programmes and lessons across the curriculum, students develop a sense of morality and the difference between right and wrong. Through the Humanities, law and registration lessons students learn that different religions have guiding principles. Students discuss laws/rules and how they are applicable to their own lives and the lives of others. Individual Liberty	Teaching and learning places an emphasis on the right of students to express their own opinions and evidence-based views. Students are encouraged to develop independence in their learning and to think for themselves. Students are taught how to stay safe on-line. This is done through the whole school curriculum and registration periods, Peace by Piece Days and assemblies. Arrangements are made to support students in school during Ramadan and EID. Celebration assemblies promote self-respect, self-esteem and self-confidence so that students see that they are important and valued in their own right.
