Bee Like Me - Year 9 Careers Morning

Year 9 spent a morning talking with women from the world of work. We had representatives from the army, the NHS, Pepsico, ideagen, Sustainable Water, Solvay Composite Materials, The University of Nottingham midwifery and life sciences schools, G F Tomlinson, Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Yorkshire, as well as an accountant. The pupils heard about their career journeys and the varied roles some of our speakers have had. They heard from people who had started their own businesses as well as people who work for large organisations. One of our speakers had been involved in the organisation of the Rio Olympics, whilst another researches into brain tumours for a charity. Pupils heard about what a midwife does as well as having the opportunity to try on and find out what goes into the packs a soldier might carry. Being involved in developing technology was also featured, with a chemical engineer bringing in examples of materials used to make bikes and prosthetic legs and someone else explaining how she goes about developing apps for a local tech company. We are very grateful for all of our speakers for giving up their time to do this.




They all came away tired but well fed (there was food galore available throughout the day) and with a swag bag filled with numerous goodies. A great day was had by all.






Brecht Workshop

Being a performing arts student, I acquire a vast range of knowledge and I am given many opportunities to expand on that knowledge. For example, in a lesson we are studying Bertolt Brecht, a practitioner who developed a new type of theatre called 'Epic Theatre', which focused on isolating the audience from the performance using song, dance, prologues, minimal set and props, so that they are able to focus on the message behind it, which regularly consisted of his political views.

We were given an opportunity to attend a Brecht workshop at Nonsuch Studios, delivered by a professor from York University, and learnt more about the practitioner. During the workshop, I learnt that aside from detaching the audience from the performance, Brecht wanted the actors in his plays to have a justification for everything that they did. Every movement had to have a reason; for example, if a character was to move an object on a table, they had to have a reason why. I was able to understand this clearly as we were given an activity to help our understanding. We worked in groups of three; my group was given the scenario of an individual going into a posh restaurant for the first time. Two of us played an old couple who had saved up for their 50th anniversary and the third person was the waiter, excellently played by Miss Hawley. Every movement that we made in the scene had to have a justification. During the scene, there were moments where I would look around in awe of the restaurant and I would do this because it was the first time that my character would have been in a fancy restaurant like that, so it was a new experience for her. I really enjoyed this opportunity as it expanded my knowledge on Brecht and allowed me to experience his style of theatre for myself with the activity we did.

Dance4 Workshop and Show

On 23 October we were given the opportunity to participate in a workshop at Dance4, Nottingham led by professional dancers from the Gary Clarke company. During the three hour workshop we took part in a contemporary warm-up and were taught repertoire from their new show, 'Wasteland', that we then developed in groups. The workshop allowed us to improve on our technique and develop our knowledge of different styles. It also allowed us to develop our team work and social skills as we worked with people we have never worked with before. When learning 'the rave' section, we gained knowledge on how the routine was choreographed and developed through the rehearsal process.

After learning choreography for the production, 'Wasteland' by Gary Clarke, in the Dance4 workshop on Wednesday, we went to go and see the show on Friday night at the Nottingham Playhouse. With our prior knowledge on the production, and the fact we had learnt part of the choreography, it was very enjoyable to watch how this fitted into the performance and how they portrayed the storyline. By taking Performing Arts at A Level, we get the opportunity to see a variety of performances, and this one was very different to anything we had ever seen before. It included minimal speech, and was mainly focused on dance and physical theatre body movements, telling the story of the downfall of Grimethorpe Colliery, ruining Britain's mining industry and the working class community that surrounded it. Reflecting on the performance afterwards, we really enjoyed the way the story was presented and the commitment of the whole cast, as we recognised how much hard work had gone into making the production. We would definitely see it again!

Words for Work programme



Year 9 pupils in literacy intervention have been taking part in a programme organised by the National Literacy Trust and run by our literacy coordinator, Mrs Cox. The programme, called Words for Work, is made up of five workshops that help pupils to develop professional vocabulary and communication expected in formal settings, like interviews and the workplace. The groups have been working with volunteers from the local community to improve their ability to communicate effectively using professional vocabulary, oracy, intonation and body language. Our pupils in literacy intervention have behaved exceptionally and have shown evidence of real progress in their ability to communicate successfully in a formal setting. Some of the activities the groups have been taking part in are: role-playing interviews, writing professional interview questions, reading and researching the routes into their chosen careers, planning for a presentation and using professional practices to communicate effectively with their volunteers. All of these skills will then be demonstrated in a formal presentation delivered by the groups of pupils in the final workshop. A really big congratulations to the literacy students in Year 9 for all of their hard work and professionalism. We are incredibly proud of the progress they have made.






